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A Word from Mr. Goetz



Hello everyone,

I hope that everyone had a great Thanksgiving break and will have a safe Christmas/New Year's break. Before we know it, the break will be here. Not only is the break not too far away, but this also means that the semester end is not too far way. If you have any questions about your child and how he/she is doing, please don't hesitate to send their teacher an email, give them a call, or stop in and visit with them. It is because of all three stakeholders that students become successful.

As December is upon us, this means that Property Tax time is coming. As this time draws closer, I want to make sure that I get the message out about the 12% Tax Buy Down expires. This means that the discount that everyone has been receiving over past number of years is not going to be there this year. Tax bills are expected to go up even without an increase in valuations because of a change in the way the state offers property-tax relief. Lawmakers decided this year to eliminate the 12% buy down of property taxes and offer to pay for county social services instead. County Auditor Mike Montplaisir has said: Piepkorn said lawmakers failed to pass comprehensive tax reform in recent years and chose to just buy down taxes with oil revenue, and there's just not much of that money any more.

As that is being stated, I want to make sure that everyone in the Wing School district understands that the Wing School did not increase mills this year. The only increase in funds is going to come from the new taxable valuations. The mills were shifted from one fund to another, but the total funds are the same as last year. The following is a breakdown of the mills levied for last year and this year: 2016-2017 General – 57.77, Miscellaneous – 6.00, and Building – 10.00 for a total of 73.77 mills levied. 2017-2018 General – 60.00, Miscellaneous – 3.77, and Building – 10.00 for a total of 73.77. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to give me a call. It is not the easiest to explain, but I will do my best to help you understand.

The last thing that I would like to talk about is the new bus routes. It is not that the routes are changing, but there are more kids being added to the bus routes. By the time of this letter, this will be already in effect, but I thought I'd better explain it. There are a few kids that are having to walk a distance to get to school. Out of the safety of all kids, the school board approved to add the in-town kids to the bus routes. My goal was to try to do this the best that I could without having to run another bus. What this did do for us was fill up all our buses. This means that if your child is having a friend stay over, it is possible that the extra child is not going to be able to ride the bus home. If your child is not going to ride, please make sure that you have contact with their bus driver so they know who is or is not riding the bus.

1st Grade – Mrs. Schill

First grade students are excited for their upcoming holiday program in December and have been practicing diligently for their parts with Mr. Barry. In reading, students have been working on beginning and ending blends (sh, ch, wh, th, -tch, -ch) along with a review of our sight words. Grammar has us working with nouns and pronouns. We will start working with long vowel sounds and vowel blends in December and work hard at reading more fluently.

Math has students adding doubles plus one, using ten to add and subtract larger numbers, and identifying congruent and noncongruent shapes.

We recently finished a science unit about natural and human-made resources and have moved onto an animal unit. This unit focuses on living things, what they need to survive, and life cycles. First graders wrote about how they would catch a turkey as well as a recipe for how to cook a turkey. Students also finished a writing project with Mrs. Mehlhoff using emojis, which they really enjoyed.


Cold as Ice!



Students will soon be working on their works cited page and paper outline for their science fair paper. Meanwhile, business English students are wrapping up practice job interviews.

Quick reminder that, before the quarter ends, students still have time to redo any grammar practices or quizzes we've done in class. Students also have until December 15th to earn their reading points for the quarter. Semester final exams will include questions about grammar, MLA formatting, reading strategies we've covered in class, as well as some questions on classroom novels.

Drama



Speech


Speech season is approaching! Students have already started preparing for competitions, which start in mid-January. Students in speech are required to have 5 hours of practice combined between working with Mr. Schock and working with Belle Bernhardt (our assistant coach) before they are eligible to compete. The time is going to go by fast!

Elite Reader Award

In order to qualify for the Elite Reader Award, students must have a total of at least 20,000 pages read by their graduation, meaning they would need to read approximately 800 pages per quarter (including books they read in their English class). Manga/comic books do not count - only books available on ACR/approved by Mr. Schock will be allowed. May be subject to random checks.



Science Notes



Biology

Students have covered cell structure and function while completing an entire unit. Topics of cells and energy, growth, and division are currently being worked on. After the new year, we will be working on genetics and evolution. The lab they have enjoyed watching evolve is the egg osmosis (what a cell looks like when it takes on salt)!

Physical Science

Students are working on states of matter and atoms while moving onto the periodic table. Scientific equations are bringing math skills into our science class time. We will be moving into solutions, acids, bases, and salts right after the new year. Their lab time is working in groups of two with mathematical equations and brainstorming on concepts of matter.

Earth Science

Students have been working in groups of their choice to complete their write-in books. Moving faster this 9 weeks, they are working at completing one of their three write-in books. They have worked hard on their rock unit with identification of hardness and types of sedimentary rocks. This group of students will continue to complete the entire first book prior to Christmas break.

Ecology

In this class we have completed several sections on science and environment, tools of environmental science, and organization of life. Our discussion include current events around the world, including local topics in our area. We will continue to learn more about how ecosystems work, biomes, and the human population once the holiday break is complete.

Physiology

This group of students have moved from breaking down the smallest units in the body to learning about the organ systems, such as the muscular system, in order to know how the human body moves. The hands-on labs for this group will increase as the content will be more visible to the naked eye.

Chemistry

This small group of students is moving quicker through topics: measurements and calculations, atoms (the building blocks of matter), and arrangement of electrons in atoms. We will be moving onto topics of: periodic law, chemical bonding, chemical formulas, and compounds. Right after the Christmas break, we will be moving into the equations and reactions, stoichiometry, and states of matter.






