It's the pits!

B.O., or body odor, is that not-so-wonderful smell that comes most often when we sweat and participate in physical activities. The smell however is not because of the sweat and activity. The smell comes from bacteria that live on the skin to break down protein into certain acids. Our age and the foods we eat all affect the odor that our bacteria produce. Spicy foods will make you more susceptible to having a more pungent body odor. Our armpits are a hotspot for this bacteria because of just that: IT'S HOT. Places like our armpits, elbow creases, and the backs of our knees are more likely to produce these smells due to their temperature.

It is generally easy to manage our hygiene or body odor. Taking showers or baths with soap helps to reduce and get rid of that bacteria. Using deodorant is another tool that we can use to manage the smell throughout the day. Our bodies are going to sweat throughout the day, so while that means we cannot take a shower every time we perspire, deodorant helps us keep the smell in check.




Women were not allowed to join the rodeo industry until the 1890’s, and now over 100 years later, women are still doing rodeo. Fall is here!





Library Remodel




Empowerment Library


Elite Readers Recognition Plaque

Our Library Board met late this summer, and along with the Marquart memorial and suggestions from administration and high school teachers, the criteria required to implement a high school elite readers recognition program is being refined. Students grades 7-12 will be given credit for any books tested on through Accelerated Reader and will begin tracking pages read through an interactive tracking system. Our English teacher Mr. Schock has been helping us define the page requirements and guidelines, and the plaque is being designed. We will not be counting graphic novels or manga. This is an honor system on behalf of our students. Random checks or synopsis may be required if there’s a need to check or clarify.





Science Notes



Biology

Students have learned about biology in the 21st century. Earth is home to large diversity of life, from microscopic organisms to large animals and humans. Students are observing various tiny microorganisms around us under the microscopes while learning to operate the different microscopes. We will be working into the structural hierarchy of life: chemistry of life, cells: structure/function, energy, and growth & division.

Physical Science

Bellringer labs, such as getting several different shapes of paper to make a fish, to full class labs of measuring the density of water and salt water in physical science has been interactive, hands-on time for this class. They are working on concepts of law vs. theory, science vs. technology, scientific method, scientific notation, and organizing data. We will be moving into density, changes of matter, and energy of matter.

Earth Science

Students have completed their first unit in their first write-in book. Throughout this unit, they learned about all of the Earth's systems, weathering, erosion, abrasion, deposition, and soil of the plant. This group of students have learned about different ways to save a beach and what might be growing in our soils. The next unit on Earth's history will be on rocks, fossils, and other natural evidence over geologic time.

Ecology

In this class we have taken field trips outdoors to explore our environment around us. Learning about the impact of the agricultural and industrial revolutions have taught us how our environment has changed for the better and worse. Discussions about the current events around the world including political topics and natural disasters, ie. hurricane Harvey & Irma. We will continue to learn more about making informed decisions for the better of our world, country, and local community.

Physiology

This smaller group of 3 have learned about the basic terminology and chemistry of the body. They have created a DNA strand out of beads of their own creation. With completion of 2 tests so far, they will be moving onto cells and cell division. They will learn how the body is put together to make it move and do the functions it needs to on a daily basis.

Chemistry

Another smaller group of 3 have learned about chemistry as a physical science, matter and changes, as well as taking measurements and calculations. We will be discussing the important topic of reading labels of bottles and safety in the laboratory. We will be moving onto atoms and arrangement of electrons in atoms.

Girls 5th and 6th Basketball



Our fifth and sixth grade basketball had their very first game on September 5! They have won two games so far against Washburn and McClusky. Wing and Wilton co-op for fifth and sixth grade basketball, and they also pulled up fourth grade. Wing's basketball player's include Peyton Saeman (4th grade), Brianna Buee (4th grade), Callie Vollmer (5th grade), and Makennah Fischer (6th grade). I was able to meet up and ask Makennah some questions about basketball.

She was competing against over 135 students and received a bronze medal. Tara said she was surprised to have done so well for only being in FFA for such a short while. When questioned if she would recommend people to attend State FFA, she said, "Yes! It was a fun learning experience. I got to meet new people and make new friends."

Tara will be competing again September 25th at Jamestown for districts. She will be competing in Parliamentary Procedure.

King of Avalon is a new and quickly rising mobile game. You build defenses and train troops. The object of the game is to grow to the top. It is available on most platforms and completely cross compatible, so you can join your friends. It is a completely free game, so you don't have to open your wallet. It does contain in-app purchasing, but don't worry. It isn't a pay-to-win.

The game gives you a little bit of a backstory when you first open the app. The graphics are definitely on the better end for mobile games. The animations are smooth and fluent for the most part. This game is highly addictive, and you can find yourself playing for a long time. The simple mechanics can be very entertaining. If you get bored, the national chat is very diverse, with all ages and all countries.

Here are the downsides: They advertise this game as though you can raise a diverse selection of dragons. In the game, however, you raise one basic dragon.
